Teachers' webinar on JPIC: At the outset of academic year 2023-24 a webinar was conducted for the teachers to enlighten them of the responsibilities of JPIC school animators, to implement and advocate care of the earth and actions to help, heal the earth and humanity.

Inauguration of JPIC CLUB 2023-24: JPIC is a way of describing our responsibility to make God's reign visible in the world by bringing good news to the poor and excluded, exposing oppression, and living in solidarity with those on the edge of society. Thus, to take a common action on threats to life in the areas of Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation, the JPIC club was inaugurated in the month of June for high school and in July for primary. Seed Banking and Collection of Saplings: Eroding plant diversity has serious implications for the well-being of humanity and our planet. Therefore, to bring awareness about this activity 'Seed banking and

collection of Saplings' was conducted on 27 June 2023, to help students in recognising the importance of biodiversity in our lives and help in conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity resources.



Classroom Eco Garden: To establish a bond between students and nature, an activity 'Classroom Eco Garden' was organised on 1 July 2023. Students enthusiastically took part and learnt the importance of indigenous species or native species of plants, as they are adapted to the soil, climate and require less water.



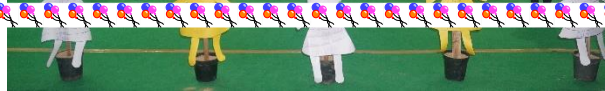
SPECIAL ASSEMBLIES: A prayer assembly was conducted by class 3A on 3 August 2023 on the topic – '**Restrain Our Desire to Buy Things.**' The children beautifully showcased the concept, by enacting a skit, a dance, and prayers with the message- 'Do shopping, considering whether we truly need an item and prioritize spending on necessities rather than indulging in desire for new things'.



Class 3B illustrated the use of '**Renewable Resources**, through a prepared assembly. They demonstrated the use of renewable resources such as solar, wind and hydroelectric power and to reduce reliance on fossil fuels, mitigating the environmental impact of energy production.



Class 3C advocated for social justice and economic equity through their meaningful prayer assembly on the theme



'Fair Trade' to make a tangible difference in the lives of individuals around the world. They made it very clear and precise, that engaging in fair trade practices to ensure that artisans and farmers, who are the backbone of our country's economy receive fair wages for their work, empowering them to improve their livelihoods and communities.



A special assembly was conducted by **class 5A** on 24 August 2023 on the topic **'Ethical Investment'**. The students advocated and educated their peer group that the creation of fair and sustainable market is only possible with consistent or ethical investment.



Class 5B students through their special assembly on the topic **'Ethical Consumption'** depicted to make it a habit to buy ethically made products that support small scale manufactures or local artisans.



The special assembly of **class 5C** demonstrated the school on **'Chemical Manure and Natural Manure'**. They enacted a skit to depict the importance of soil and its uses. It helped students to expand their understanding of the soil world. They illustrated through their demonstration, that organic manure is environment friendly and using organic manure instead of chemical fertilizers is good for plants.



Class 4A gave awareness to students and teachers on the topic **'Divestment from Fossil Fuels'** the burning of fossil fuels adds a lot of carbon into the atmosphere, making the earth warmer. It was beautifully explained that renewable energy or green sources of energy like solar and wind energy provide electricity without impacting environment and do not get exhausted and thus gave an impact to switch on to the alternative green sources of energy.



Water is very important in our life. **The students of class 4C** emphasized through their special assembly on the theme **"Efficient Water Consumption"**. They demonstrated on how our little act can change to reduce water wastage and by choosing more water efficient products such as to install low flow water fixtures, check for and repair leaks, to collect rainwater, take shorter showers and so on.

The students of class 2A enthusiastically conducted an assembly on the topic **'Sustainable Lifestyle'** through which they made everyone understand how our lifestyle choices affect the world around us and



finding ways as to how we run our homes, what food we get around, how we relax, what we buy, and how we care for our planet.



Class 2B students displayed a very thought-provoking prayer service by taking the topic **“Plants are Our Friends”**. They enlightened us with the thoughts that the plants are not green decorations, but they are our silent companions, providing oxygen, food and countless other benefits.

The tiny tots of class 2C with their small steps marched towards sustainable development goals, exhibited their knowledge on

‘Laudato Si’ by choosing the topic for their special assembly, **‘Avoid Things Which Exploit the Children’**. They educated others to stop using gadgets and not to eat junk food.

The ardent students of **Class 1A** conducted a special assembly on the theme **‘Protection of the Eco System’** with much zeal and fervour. They taught the school that the first step to preserve eco system is to remember that we are a part of them and preserving eco system starts at home. Creating simple habits like turning off lights and appliances when

The annual report of NPS JPIC club highlights various activities undertaken throughout the year to provide environmental awareness and sustainability. The month of June was dedicated to raise awareness about the environment and promoting water conservation in our school. Various activities were organized to engage students and encourage their active participation. These activities included poster making, recitation of poems, placards and more. This report provides an overview of the events and highlights of each activity. We decided to conduct JPIC assembly on 5 June. We celebrated “World Environment Day” in a grand way. This day will be a reminder to people to be more considerate and aware of the Earth’s existing conditions, in terms of the environment.

Poster making Competition: Poster-making competition was conducted on World Environment Day. Students from the four houses enthusiastically participated in the competition. The theme for the posters was “Save our Planet”. The students showcased their artistic skills and creativity by designing appealing posters that highlighted the importance of environmental conservation and sustainable practices. Club members pasted notices like save water, save electricity, etc. at the wash areas and in all the classrooms as reminders.

After the assembly there was a tree plantation drive for students.



Plant a Sapling: “Plant a Sapling” was organized in the school premises. Students from each class brought a sapling and they are assigned to protect their plant throughout the year. It creates a love for nature. They were educated about the benefits of plant in maintaining a healthy environment. Placards were used as a simple and effective way to remind them about the importance of water conservation. The placards displayed catchy slogans such as:- “Save Water; Save Life”, “Every Drop Counts” to create awareness about the need to conserve water resources.

Water Conservation: Students actively participated in water conservation efforts by collecting water from their used water bottles and using it to water the plants in the school garden. This initiative not only saved water but also nurtured in them a sense of responsibility towards the environment.

Plant care and protection: Club members took the responsibility of caring for plants within the school premises ensuring that they received adequate water, sunlight, and maintenance. They also organized tree-planting drives to enhance greenery and biodiversity in the campus.





Anti-Narcotic Day: Anti-Narcotics Day is celebrated every year in our school to raise awareness of drugs and to understand its adverse effects. This year too an Anti-Narcotic awareness program was conducted in the school by the JPIC Club. An assembly held on 19 July created an awareness on the ill-effects of drugs and alcohol consumption. Ms. Elaine Gustine(IX A) and Mr. Emil Tom(IX A) rendered a beautiful speech, informing that every day India sees ten suicides related to drug abuse. They also added that a report by the Central Government demonstrated that a vast majority of youth are receiving drug and alcohol prevention messages from sources such as TV, Radio, Posters, Movies etc. At this event Principal stated that youth are the largest force of our nation, and they must be directed in a positive way for their happy, healthy and holy living.

Caption Writing Competition: Several programs were conducted on the Anti-Narcotic Day, but Caption writing took a place in everybody's heart. It was an individual event and all the students from class VIII to X participated in this competition. It made everyone think about the dangers of drugs and alcohol.

Choral Recitation Competition: Poem recitation was conducted in our school on 21 July. "Water Conservation" was the theme of this competition. All the students from class I to IX took part in the recitation. The class teachers painstakingly trained the students to recite the poem, keeping in mind their facial expressions, voice modulations and diction at the time of delivery. The best performers were awarded prizes. These activities enable the pupils to work closely in a group and to be able to communicate with each other with lots of love and care within.

Cleanliness Drives: Regular clean-up campaigns were organized to keep the school and its premises litter-free. Students engaged in picking up trash, segregating waste, and promoting proper waste disposal practices to maintain a clean and hygienic environment.
